


## Department closes all hiking spots in Mahikeng

illegal transport operations in Mahikeng and encourages communities to utilise authorised public transport. The Departmental MEC, Dr Mpho Mothabane send a strong warning to those operating without operating licenses and said the Department will conduct a special clampdown operation in order to close all hiking spots and illegal transport operators in Mahikeng. "We are not going to allow our people to be transported with vehicles that do not have operating permits.

These illegal operators put the lives of our people in danger and we will not allow this," he said. He said the department has declared war on illegal and unauthorised taxi operators in Mahikeng. "This concerted program is deliberately geared towards 'reclaiming' of our streets and roads campaign, in line with a clear government position of Re-positioning, Rebranding and Renewal of Bokone Bophirima Province in general and Mahikeng in particular," explained Mothabane.

The department has recently noticed that



the phenomenon of Dillogwana, hijking and illegal taxi operations seems to have become a norm and somewhat persistent. This follows mushrooming of unofficial ranks which are being operated through stubbornness, violence and aggressiveness.

"This has become a Road Safety and Passenger Transport hazard and a nest for manifestation of public transport conflicts that are often characterised by high speed chases, passengers being harassed and taxi violence erupting.

Our law enforcement officials together with South African Police Service officers and Taxi conflict unit are on the ground, working around the clock to clamp down all these illegal operations as well as close down all the unofficial ranks established all over Mahikeng, such as the one operating near the Caltex garage in town, Cookes Lake and Ronholand, near Danville an

route Lichtenburg," he warned. The other unofficial ranks are operated near Mahikeng, Primary and Secondary School and Stadium as well as outside the Sasol garage in Riviera Park en route Zeenuts, N18 road and near Stadt Village robots, opposite the Airport road junction along and en route Vryburg. "My office is worried about sporadic taxi conflicts in general and we are monitoring and intervening in all reported cases. We cannot afford another simmering tension affecting the public transport, especially the Taxi industry which we could face, if not careful. We will not fold our arms and do nothing." Ours, as a government is not only to maintain peace and stability in order to ensure that law and order is not compromised but to issue operating licenses and permits to deserving operators who made applications. "We will not shy away from being tough on those illegal public transport, hijking lords and pirates using seven (7) to nine (9) seater Avanza's, Bakkies', Verso's and unauthorised normal taxis. We will impound these vehicles and slap them with heavy traffic fines. We are also contemplating the amendment of the law to ensure that all repeat offenders will have their vehicles impounded. Such vehicles should only be returned after a legal process would have concluded in favour of the operator, otherwise the car should be ceded to the state!" We cannot afford this state of lawlessness and deliberate paralysis. This must stop and people must make applications to the department through proper channels if they want to operate public transportation.

No one will be allowed to wake up and operate, willy nilly, as if the government is helpless," Concluded Mothabane. This clampdown campaigns started mid-July 2017 and will continue until those ranks are closed permanently.

**Man's disappearance sparks riots**

Farmer accused of shooting and concealing body

"I want my child. Even if I only find his corpse, it's fine." These were the words of a weeping Martha Ndlovu, a mother in Majakaneng, a rural community in North West.

Her 24-year-old son Tebogo was allegedly shot and killed by a white farmer two weeks ago and his body has not been found. The farmer was said to have opened fire on Tebogo and two others when he allegedly caught them stealing oranges. The pair that escaped apparently told police and Tebogo's family that they saw him collapsing after being shot.

Residents of Majakaneng have embarked on a violent protest since Sunday evening, demanding answers about Tebogo's disappearance.

A crowd protested outside the farm and in parts of Majakaneng yesterday.

Sowetan saw two burnt vehicles and a long-distance delivery truck being vandalised and stripped in the area.

Police fired rubber bullets and teargas

as some protesters threw stones at them.

Tebogo's mother joined the throng outside the farm: "My son can't just die and I don't know where he's buried. They must give me his corpse."

She accused police of keeping her in the dark about their investigation and for not explaining why the farmer had not been arrested.

"This is hurtful considering the number of weeks my son has been gone."

She resorted to asking the community to help her find Tebogo. "I realised I won't find my son if I rely on police."

Resident Mike Mbanjwa said: "We want this white man to hand over the body to the family so they'll find closure. The community is angry right now."

The police's Brigadier Sabata Mokgwabone said a missing person's case had been opened and they were also investigating two cases of attempted murder based on the accounts of Tebogo's alleged accomplices that they were shot at.

Asked why police had not opened a murder case, Mokgwabone said: "The two said to us he was still alive when they left him. If we find the body, the missing person's case may change to that of murder."

**Protesters burn two trucks and a van**

TWO trucks and a van were burnt during a protest in Majakaneng near Brits yesterday following allegations that a farmer shot a 24-year-old man for stealing oranges at his farm. "Police are requesting members of the community in and around Majakaneng as well as Mooi Nooit to assist with any information that may shed light on a missing person enquiry and attempted

murder case registered at Mooi Nooit police station," said Brigadier Sabata Mokgwabone. "The 24-year-old man has not been seen since that day."

The N4 highway between Rustenburg and Pretoria and the Old Pretoria Road were blocked and protesters pelted passing vehicles with stones. - ANA

RESIDENTS of Majakaneng in North West have been on the rampage since the weekend.

Their anger has been triggered by the disappearance of Tebogo Ndlovu (24).

Tebogo went missing on 2 August after he and two friends were allegedly busted a farm owner for stealing from his farm in the area.

Angry residents blocked the busy N4 highway leading to Rustenburg, stoning cars is missing and even setting two alight.

Tebogo's cousin Benny Larmino (26) said he was with him and Thabiso Shole (24) when

the incident happened. Benny said they had gone to the farm to steal oranges but changed their minds when they saw metal and decided they would make quick cash if they sold it instead.

"The farmer caught us and started shooting at us. He wounded Tebogo in the thigh," he said. They were carrying Tebogo as they ran away but the farmer continued to shoot.

"We were too tired so we left Tebogo at the farm and continued running. We thought we'd come back with the police to get him."

Benny said when they ar-

rived home, they told Tebogo's mum what had happened and she phoned the cops, but they never arrived.

When Tebogo didn't show up the next day, they again called the police but still nothing happened.

On Friday they went to the Majakaneng cop shop and a van was finally dispatched to go to the farm with them.

Benny said they found blood on the ground at the farm. "The farmer denied having seen me or Tebogo on that day," Benny said.

"The family claims cops have sent them from pillar to post.

Tebogo's mother Martha Ndlovu (68) said: "I don't support them stealing, but my son didn't deserve to be killed."

Police spokesman Brigadier Sabata Mokgabone said Tebogo was still missing.

"A missing person's inquiry and attempted murder cases are being investigated."

# Woman empowerment 'urgent'

**Deputy Minister of Transport Sindisiwe Chikungwa launched the South African Network for Women in Transport**

DEPUTY Minister of Transport Sindisiwe Chikungwa launched the South African Network for Women in Transport (Sanwit) provincial structure at Mbambana Taung on Monday.

Chikungwa said women empowerment had always been urgent but never as much as it is now. She said it was made more important by consistent and persistent calls for radical economic transformation.

“Sanwit was established in 2008 with the main objectives of encouraging women to enter and succeed in the transport industry through facilitating enterprise development, networking and supporting women for success and growth, negotiating on behalf of members for wealth generation and lobbying and advocating for policy environment that will support and enable the sustainability of women enterprise,” Chikungwa said.

“We came here to launch the provincial chapter. This was agreed upon during Sanwit’s summit in 2015. We acknowledge that women are faced with many challenges within the sector. However, we also reckon that there are successful stories too. The transport sector is male dominated hence the policies say we need to bring women on board,” Chikungwa said.

She said there were many opportunities for women to be explored.

Chikungwa argued that women should take advantage of the opportunities and the government would continue to transform the sector.

“We want to bring women on board

particular, because the industry has been dominated by males forever. We believe that now is the time for them to give women space. We have set aside a budget for youth and women businesses,” she said.

Mothlabane shared the sentiments. He said the structure that had been launched would benefit women in the sense that they were more organised and had been exposed to opportunities that were available in the government and private sector.

“Our department will expose them to opportunities that exist in the transport industry. Remember that 50% of our population in South Africa is women. So, when women benefit economically, it means we will achieve our goal of radical economic transformation.

“It is an opportune moment for women to make their mark through our necessary support.

“When you empower women, you empower the better part of the society,” Mothlabane said.

Dr Ruth Mompati district mayor, Botumelo Mahlangu said: “We have not done well in communicating with our communities so that they understand the opportunities that are available for them within the government.

“The initiative is part of service delivery that will improve the lives of the masses especially women.

“This is a rare moment that has been created by the ANC-led government to empower women.

“They are also able to enter transport industry and we encourage them to come and take advantage of available opportunities,” she said. - Newsnote

The deputy minister also highlighted that state-owned companies will also come on board to ensure that Sanwit structure is efficient.

“Small micro-medium enterprises (SMMEs) are the backbone of the economy. One of the Sanwit objectives is to support and provide mentorship to all those who have businesses in the transport sector.

“Women will be considered in their structure.

“We have our action plan that was adopted during our summit in 2015. That should be implemented by the leadership that is here too,” Chikungwa said.

“We have agreed with community safety and transport MEC Mphephu Mothabane that there must be a person responsible for liaising with the pro-
