Klerksdorp road safety campaign launched

Card-skimming case highlights crime concerns

POLICE in Taung have called on residents to be extra vigilant this festive season as the risk of card skimming incidents is said to be high.

This came in the wake of the ongoing bank card skimming case where three men from the Free State were nabbed after fleecing people of their hard-earned cash in Taung.

The three suspects Mojalefa Springerkan, 30, Kgosana Tladi, 49, and David Mokonyane, 52, face fraud charges and their case was this week postponed to January 22.

The trio from Free State arrested two months ago by police's crime intelligence in partnership with Taung police station after receiving a tip-off.

The accused allegedly defrauded unsuspecting victims their hard-earned cash at the ATMs across Dr Ruth Mompati district. The investigating officer, WO Kagiso Phemelo told the court how the suspects were eventually arrested.

The suspects allegedly robbed another woman of her Sassa card at Pudimoe complex in Pudimoe location, near Taung.

The police followed them until Taung Mall where they were allegedly stopped and searched. The police found loads of various bank cards in their possession.

"The suspects were arrested and the police confiscated the vehicle that was used during the commission of crime. All three suspects have previous and pending fraud cases," Phemelo said.

National Prosecuting Agency regional spokesperson Frank Lesenyego said: "The case was postponed after the suspects obtained a new legal team.

"All three suspects were cross-examined except Kgosana Tladi who submitted his evidence through affidavit.

"The magistrate will make judgment immediately after heads of argument. We are adamant that the NPA has water-tight case against the suspects. They have previous convictions and others have pending cases."

People are urged to be alert during festive season. - Newsnote
