'COPS PROTECT DRUG DEALERS'

Tensions run high after alleged attack

THE WAR between residents and alleged drug dealers continued this week.

The situation in Rustenburg, North West remained tense after allegations of drug dealers arriving at the weekend and attacking locals at a tavern.

Seventeen suspected drug dealers were bust.

Last week, six residents were bust for damaging property and the murder of a suspected Nigerian drug dealer.

On Monday, residents gathered at the Rustenburg Magistrates Court, where CPF chairman Israel Maimane appeared.

But the NPA refused to put his case on the roll and ordered police to investigate properly.

People said cops bust their leaders to intimidate them and protect drug dealers. They said when cops came to bust Mai-

mane, he was to have been charged with malicious damage to property for burning a vehicle but they changed the charge to murder without explanation.

Community leaders and councillors were allegedly put on a wanted list after they met near the police station on Saturday and residents tried to shut down the cop shop.

Maimane said cops refused to

go with them to suspected drug dealers' houses. "I called home owners to tell them to evict tenants involved in drugs. As a man from one of the houses died, the police linked me to his death."

Brigadier Sabata Mokgwabone said five cases of robbery, assault and aggravated robbery were opened on Sunday.

He was not able to comment on the allegations.

TAXI DRIVERS SHUT DOWN CITY!

NORTH West's platinum city ground to a halt on Tuesday as the war between taxi drivers and foreigners raged.

Taxi rank entrances in Rustenburg were closed, with no traffic moving in or out.

The trouble started when cops seized a taxi allegedly linked to a crime that happened on Sunday.

In a meeting between taxi drivers, owners and a negotiation forum, the drivers asked for the taxi rank, the drivers asked for the taxi to be released and the driver not to be arrested.

They accused cops of neglect-

ing to foreigners' complaints. They said they felt unsafe since the trouble started over the weekend.

They repeated their demand that suspected brothels be raided. A driver said he felt unsafe because they had been attacked by foreigners.

"They're out for blood. They have targeted us as taxi drivers and we must protect ourselves," he said.

"We are raiding the brothels to protect our residents."

Forum chairman Herman Se-

bego spoke to the angry drivers

and said the taxi will only be re-

turned if the owner or driver reports to the Rustenburg cop shop. "I understand drivers are angry but the taxi cannot be released without the driver or owner making a statement," he said. He said a police task team will be formed to work with drivers. "Houses suspected of belonging

to drug gangs will be raided with the help of the team."

Sebego encouraged operators to report crime to the police.

Captain Elsie Augoustidis said police were attending to the situation.

She promised to respond to Dai-

Punish violent motorists!

Minister says court should give harsh sentence to drivers after two assaulted traffic officer who stopped them

THE courts should set an example by giving a hefty sentence to two motorists who appeared in the Potchefstroom Magistrate's Court for the assault of a traffic cop, says Transport Minister Joe Maswanganyi.

Sabata Kortman, 32, and his sister Nswaki Kortman, 26, were arrested after they allegedly assaulted Johannes Manthi, a traffic cop when he stopped them on the N12 between Potchefstroom and Klerksdorp on December 12 last year.

Kortman is said to have also threatened to cut off Manthi's manhood.

Maswanganyi, together with community safety and transport management MEC Dr Mpho Motlhabane attended court proceedings on Tuesday.

They said that it was a very serious incident and believed that the judiciary should send a message to the entire country through this case to ensure that such perpetrators know that there is justice in the country.

"No one is allowed to disobey the law and all of us are subject to the Constitution, therefore we are making a plea to the judiciary to send a message and remind these criminals that there is a justice system in the country," he said.

"We are leaving this case to the hands of the judiciary that the law must take its

"Continue doing your work knowing that you have support from us as whatever you are doing is the best for the country," he said.

The case of the two motorists was postponed to February 20.

The two are out on R5 000 and R2 000 bail respectively.

Manthi is seen on a recorded video manhandling Manthi during the incident.

Manthi said he had given Sabata fine for overtaking on a barrier line.

"I was on duty with two of my female colleagues 12km outside Potchefstroom when the incident happened.

"I stopped the motorist who was driving a Toyota Yaris after he overtaking another vehicle on the barrier line, gave him a fine for breaking the law. However, all hell broke loose when requested a physical address from him."

"Kortman gave me a postal address instead, but I explained to him that needed a physical address. He failed to cooperate and hurled insults at me. He demanded his drivers licence back but I refused. Kortman manhandled and assaulted me in the process," Manthi said.

The 47-year-old policeman lives with a disability after surviving a horrific accident in 2013.
