## Panic buttons handed to Pella village elderly

ABOUT 100 elderly people from Pella village in the Madikwe received panic buttons known as "mmeza" from provincial police commissioner, Lt-Gen Balle Motswayane

to be used when their security is being threatened. The panic buttons were handed over during a safety awareness campaign in the village.

The campaign came after several elderly people were reported missing in the area recently. North West police, the department of community safety and transport management, social development, community police forums and Bakwena-Ba-Madikwe Tribal Authority joined hands to hold the awareness campaign.

The provincial police management said the awareness campaign educated and sensitised the elderly on their rights.

North West police spokesperson, Brig Sabeta Molgwabone said: "The awareness emanated from a number of reported missing elderly persons in the area of Madikwe, particularly in Pella village.

"It became clear during the investigations of those incidents that most of the victims were and are living alone or with their grandchildren," Molgwabone said although

three elderly people reported missing from January last year were found alive, one was found dead.

"It was also noted that due to lack of proper care and security, some of the elderly persons end up being vic-

tims of crimes such as rape, assault and other crimes. In some instances, the elderly people are abused physically by their relatives, especially grandchilidren," he said.

Batshele Pege from the department of social development said the rights and care of older persons is stipulated in law and should be respected by everyone in society.

Others who spoke at the gathering said it was vital that every young person must embrace and serve the elderly persons with their utmost best.

Motswayane emphasised the importance of talking care of older persons and to ensure their security. She said this in response to the questions asked by the elderly persons after being afforded an opportunity to engage with the provincial

commissioner.

Motswayane tasked relevant commanders to attend with immediate effect to specific complaints raised by the elderly persons.

She encouraged those who are abused by their relatives to apply for protection orders in terms of the Domestic Violence Act, 1998 (Act No 116 of 1998).

When activated, the panic button of "mmeza" will draw attention of other persons to give assistance to the holder or the activator.

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# Province loses three police officers in Ngcobo

They died with their boots on, working to keep the communities of Bokone Bophirima safe.

Three police officers from the province died in a car accident in Ngcobo in the Eastern Cape in the early hours of Tuesday, as they navigated the area in search of a suspect wanted for two cases of murder, rape and assault with intent to do grievous bodily harm.

MEC for Community Safety and Transport Management, Dr Mokgantshang Mpho Mothabane, sent heartfelt condolences to families and friends of the three South African Police Service (SAPS) officials.

He said Sergeant Sylvester Tokotshane (33), Constable Kgathato Tawo (34) - both from Taung - and Constable Modisagaarekwe Kodisang (35) from Madibogo village near Mahikeng died on the scene of the accident, while their one colleague survived with serious injuries and is in hospital.

"We would like to express our heartfelt condolences to the families of three Provincial Tracking Team members who died due to a motor vehicle accident in the early hours of Tuesday at Ngcobo in Eastern Cape. We also wish a speedy recovery to the fourth member who was seriously injured," MEC Mothabane said. "Contrary to earlier reports, the members were neither in the Eastern Cape to attend a memorial service nor as part of

a team assigned to investigate the incident that occurred in Ngcobo last week [the attack on a police station in which five policemen were killed]. They departed from Potchefstroom to Mthatha in Eastern Cape on Monday afternoon," he said.

Mothabane further said the deceased were tracing a suspect on two cases of

# Drivers' demerit system explained

THE drivers' demerit points system introduced by parliament last year was discussed by stakeholders yesterday.

The National Press Club held a media briefing on the Administrative Adjudication of Road Traffic Offences Amendment Act currently in force in Joburg and Tshwane.

According to the Act, drivers are penalised for breaking traffic rules.

If a driver gets more than 12 demerit points, their licence is suspended for three months for every extra point they get.

Once a driver's licence is suspended for the third time, it's cancelled and destroyed.

The number of points will be reduced by one for every three months in which no more points have been added.

Howard Dembovsky of Justice Project SA criticised the Act, saying: "The act has brought with it the concept of an alleged infringer being guilty until they prove themselves innocent."

He advised anyone who has a driver's licence to read the act carefully.
