Provincial suspect raiding operation nets 280 suspects

MAHIKENG MAIL-MAHIKENG: The provincial detectives nabbed 280 suspects at all seven policing clusters for various offences through suspect raiding operations held between last Thursday and Friday as part of the ongoing Operation Fiela II police

programme.

The suspects included 133 arrested for various incidents of assaults, 17 for common robbery, 17 for malicious damage to property, 15 for rape, 22 for residential and business burglary, 16 for theft while others were nabbed for numerous other offences. Of these arrests, 68 were for crimes against women and children.

A total of 75 suspects were arrested in Klerksdorp, 56 in Rustenburg, 45 in

Mahikeng, and 43 in Brits while others were arrested in Zeerust, Vryburg and Pudimoe clusters.

The North West Provincial Commissioner, Lieutenant General Baile Motswenyane lauded the members for their hard work that led to the success of the operation. She said that the police would continue with various operations to make certain that perpetrators were brought to book.

Truck burnt in protest

A TRUCK was set alight and a man arrested during a service delivery protest at Manamakgotheng outside Rustenburg, North West police said yesterday.

Lieutenant-Colonel Amanda Funani said a truck, passing through the village, was torched on Tuesday and one man was arrested for malicious damage to property.

He was expected to appear in the Mankwe Magistrate's Court in Mogwase this morning.

Residents of Manamakgotheng embarked on a protest demanding better services.

The Moses Kotane municipality appealed to residents to refrain from disruptive behaviour. – African News Agency (ANA)

STUDENTS living off campus of North West University in Mahikeng have been targets of crime for years. Just in the past weeks, two students, Mpho Moswang (19) and Sinikezile Madigizela, were attacked and robbed in separate incidents.

Moswang was attacked in her room at Dibate Village and was shot on her right shoulder by unknown assailants wearing balaclavas.

Madigizela was assaulted, robbed

and stabbed several times in the bushy area around a train level crossing in Unit6 on Thursdaynight. Both victims are still recuperating at Bophelong and Victoria hospitals. Moswang recalled: "Two men gained entry into my room after they

tampered with the door. I was woken up by the commotion they made outside.

"One of them fired a warning shot into the roof. Another reached for my laptop and I was shot in the right arm. They fled the scene with my laptop. I thought I was going to die."
University spokesman Christo-

pher Motabogi confirmed the attacks on students. He said the university was trying to solve the campus accommodation shortage.

"We have arrested one suspect in connection with two cases and other suspects are still at large. House robbery and attempted murder cases have been opened," she said.

Meanwhile, Shoppers were also warned not to leave their vehicle windows open and doors unlocked when left unattended, while hundreds of pamphlets outlining safety tips and procedures of reporting domestic violence were being distributed by other participants.

COMMUNITY safety MEC Dr Mpho Mothabane has appealed for calm in Gopane village, near Zeerust, after two gruesome murders have left the community on edge.

A 75-year-old woman was found murdered last week, prompting community members to hunt for the perpetrator.

A man suspected to have killed the grandmother was then captured and reportedly hanged by an angry mob.

Condemning the vigilante action, Motlhabane said residents should not interfere with police investigations.
