

Two arrested for business robbery

TWO men aged 25 and 34 were arrested after they robbed a Ganyesa government entity and fled with state-owned vehicles. A third person is still at large.

The men forcefully entered a government building in Ganyesa and fled with two state-owned vehicles.

Lt-Col Amanda Funani said: "The

men who were wearing balaclavas entered the building carrying firearms and pangas and tied five security guards with cable ties and demanded the office keys.

"The suspects fled the scene with two state-owned vehicles, a Volkswagen Polo and a Toyota Hilux bakkie. Subsequent to reporting the matter to the police, the neighbouring police stations were alerted."

She said the first man was arrested in Vryburg still driving the Volkswagen Polo while the Toyota Hilux was found abandoned in the bushes near Amalia.

"Following an intensive investigation, the second suspect aged 25 was nabbed in Morokweng village.

"Both suspects are expected to appear in the Ganyesa and Vryburg magistrate's courts today," Funani said.

10 in court for double murder

TEN people face two counts of murder and other serious charges when they appear in the Klerksdorp Magistrate's Court today.

They were arrested after a fatal shooting in Khuma near Stilfontein on Saturday at 8pm.

Police managed to stop two vehicles the accused were travelling in after fol-

lowing up on information from members of the public.

North West police spokesperson Lt-Col Amanda Funani said: "When the suspects' vehicle was stopped, the police made a follow up on information that five people were shot at Extension 11, Khuma. Two victims who were neighbours, a 40-year-old man and a 30-year-old woman, died during the incident."
