under fire for promising
to send amaberete back
into the townships.

But Mbalula has stuck to his guns.

AMABERETE WILL SOON BE BACK ON THE STREETS.

Today, Mbalula and Lieutenant-General Gary Kruser will relaunch the tactical response

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and tracking teams, known as amaberete, in Tshwane.

Mbalula's spokesman, Vuyo Mhaga, said amaberete were being relaunched to deal with crimes like hijacking and high risk incidents.

The unit was established by former police commissioner Bheki Cele in 2011, with some apparent success, but videos also emerged of them slapping and

kicking customers in taverns and forcing taxi drivers to do push-ups on the side of the road.

Mbalula first hinted amaberete could be making a comeback when he addressed marchers to the Springs Police Station in Ekurhuleni in July.

The marchers had taken to the street to voice their worries about crimes against women and children in the area.

At the time, Mbalula said: "I will bring back the unit.

"I will send the tracing unit after those who were arrested and released."

At the time, South African Policing Unit general secretary Oscar Skommere said the unit was not the right one to deal with the wave of violent crimes against women and children, or other crimes.

"We know the tactical response and tracking teams are skop en donner. What are you going to do when a person is already dead?" Skommere asked.

The Police and Prisons Civil Rights Union said it was fully behind Mbalula's decision to send the unit back into the townships. Its spokesman, Rich-

ard Mamabolo, said the unit was misplaced in the police and doing things it was not

meant to do.

He said the unit must be used to deal with kidnapping, cash-intransit robberies and the use of illegal firearms.

Mhaga said that members of the response and tracking teams had been sent for refresher courses and skills improvement programmes to ensure a secure environment for South Africans.

He said police management had committed themselves to improving service delivery through initiatives to combat crime, improve reaction time and to make sure those responsible for high risk incidents were caught.
