Hundreds march against human trafficking

HUNDREDS of men in uniform including the police, correctional services officers and firefighters embarked on a march against human trafficking and women and child abuse.

They marched from the Rustenburg taxi rank to the municipal offices and were joined by municipal officials from Kgetleng Rivier and Rustenburg.

Long loud warning sounds of sirens from fire department and police vehicles could be heard as the marchers made their way through the streets of the city.

The marchers carried placards reading "Please Say No Human Trafficking", "No to Threatened Families" and "No

to Women and Children Abuse".

They called for men to take a stand against the abuse of women and children in the area.

The marchers said they could not remain silent while the scourge continued unabated as it was of great concern.

"Today we want to say enough is

enough. We want to say stop the vio-lence against women and children and to raise awareness of the challenges we are facing as the community," municipal public safety director Phopho Kotsedi said

Mayor Mpho Khunou said the killing of women and children was a cause for concern and was disturbing.

"Brothels in Rustenburg should be identified and closed as that is where the abuse starts," Khonou said.

The small town of Coligny hogged the headlines for weeks on end as angry residents demanded the two accused be denied bail.

On the day they were granted bail, several buildings in the town were

torched.

Incidents of farm attacks continue to polarise racial relations in the North West and elsewhere as thugs also attack and kill farmers.

At the beginning of this month, two farmers were attacked and killed in

areas around Vryburg. In the first incident, Elsa Erasmus, 74, who stayed alone, was abducted and killed on her farm situated between

Amalia and Vryburg.

The farmer's whereabouts became subject to police investigations after her friends realised that her house had been ransacked. Erasmus's body was later found a few metres from her bakkie.

In the other incident, Patrick Itumeleng was fatally shot when he was attacked together with his family at Friesland farm, also near Vryburg.
