

Numsa urges police to 'negotiate in good faith'

THE National Union of Metalworkers of South Africa (Numsa) has called on the SAPS to "negotiate in good faith" as it prepares to meet at the CCMA with SA Police Union (Sapu), over the 0111 workers salary dispute. Numsa acting spokesperson Thakamile Hlubi said the SAPS should be willing to listen to workers demands in order to resolve the wage dispute as soon as possible.

"Workers at the 10111 call centre do not earn the same as other workers in government institutions who do the same kind of work. Numsa condemns this kind of unfair labour practice. This is precisely the kind of principle that employers in the engineering sector wish to impose on our members, which is why we are now on the verge of a nationwide strike," Hlubi said.

At least 5 000 workers affiliated to

SAPU temporarily suspended their strike to allow talks to proceed.

Among other demands topping the list, Sapu called on the 10111 operators' salary level to be increased by two notches, an estimated increase of R50 000 yearly.

Sapu general secretary Oscar Skommer on Friday warned that employers should not think that workers had "given in" by suspending the strike, because the suspension is only for

CCMA negotiations to continue without any pressure.

"We have suspended our industrial action for the benefit of the public we serve," Skommer said.

As the metalworkers union gears up for a "life or death" strike in the engineering sector, the union urged SAPS to practice the government's "Batho Pele" principle in order to ensure that the people were served.

"This government cannot claim to

be promoting 'radical economic transformation' when state institutions are guilty of exploiting workers in the same way that greedy capitalists exploit workers. Police management is putting the lives of South Africans at risk by exploiting Sapu members and forcing them to strike," Hlubi said.

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Six to appear for taxi boss' murder

SIX men will appear in the Brits Magistrate's Court tomorrow after they were arrested for the murder of a taxi owner in Brits.

The six were apprehended after a thorough investigation by the police.

They will also face charges of attempted murder and conspiracy to commit murder.

North West police spokesperson Brig Sabata Mokgwabone said the accused are aged between 33 and 63.

"The men were arrested on July 15 and 16 in Maboloka, Lethabile and

Alexandra in Gauteng. According to information the suspects fired several shots and killed a man who was driving a Toyota Corolla on June 15 along Letlhakaneng Road, Brits," Mokgwabone said.

"The accused believed at the time of the incident that the man was a taxi owner. The alleged target was a passenger in the same car."

Mokgwabone said after a thorough and tireless effort, the investigating team managed to arrest four men in Lethabile and Maboloka villages.

"The other two accused believed to be hitmen were arrested in Alexandra,

Gauteng and found in possession of two illegal firearms. The police seized three vehicles that are suspected to have been used in the commission of the crimes."

The six men were remanded in custody after a brief appearance in the Brits Magistrate's Court last week Sunday. They will appear in the same court tomorrow for a formal bail application.

Acting provincial police commissioner Maj-Gen Ryno Naidoo said the arrests will send a clear message that lawlessness will not be tolerated.

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
