Fraudster Positive Jailed for three years for R100000

A MAN found guilty on six counts of fraud has been sentenced to three years direct imprisonment by the Atamelang Magistrate's Court.

Andrew Lekgari, 47, was convicted after it became clear that he had defrauded the North West social development department of more than R100 000.

His case was dealt with by the Hawks.

Hawks provincial spokesperson Capt Tlangelani Rikhotso said Lekgari committed the crimes between October and December 2014.

"The accused was employed as a project manager for the Multi Skill Development Corporation in Madibogo.

"The non-government organisation was allocated funds for a project by the department to service the community. As the project manager, the accused was expected to see to the successful completion of the project.

"However, between October and December 2014, he would submit fraudulent invoices to the department for fictitious services rendered," Rikhotso said.

After the said submissions, Lekgari would pocket the money paid out by the department.

"The matter was investigated and the suspect was subsequently arrested for fraud. The money involved was about R109 033."

North West Hawks head Maj-Gen Linda Mbana warned that people must not think that they can steal from the state and get away with it.

"Fraud is a very serious offence and the Hawks are working tirelessly to curb it in the province," Mbana said.

Cop killed while chatting

AN OFF-DUTY police officer was shot and killed in a hijacking incident in Letlhabile, near Brits at the weekend.

A swift response by the police led to the arrest of a 35-year-old man and the recovery of the hijacked vehicle in Soshanguve, Pretoria.

The deceased cop has been identified only as 35-year-old Const Hlongwane

North West provincial commissioner Lt-Gen Baile Motswenyane commended Brits police's trio task team for the arrest of the man in Soshanguve.

Provincial police spokesperson Brig Sabata Mokgwabone said: "The arrest came after a manhunt was launched following an incident in which three suspects allegedly shot and killed Const Hlongwane, 35 and robbed his friend of his BMW about 9pm in Letlhabile near Brits on June 2," he said.

Mokgwabone said that the offduty constable and his friend were attacked while having a chat by the roadside.

"Indications are that the police officer was walking along Letlhabile main road when his friend, driving in a BMW, stopped for a chat.

"They were still chatting when two unknown males confronted them with firearms.

"Although the constable managed to pull out his service firearm, the suspects shot him in the left arm and head.

"Upon firing back and before he died on the scene, Hlongwane reportedly shot one of the suspects in the left arm and lower body," Mokgwabone said.
