The programs were community driven as North West communities have accepted the fact that criminals lives amongst them and that as communities they are no longer keeping quiet about crime but are taking an active role to assist SAPS to restore safety of the community.

Whilst on the other hand, Road Safety Participatory Education Technique (PET) competition was held simultaneously with road safety debate. The PET is an educational flagship programme which aims at changing learners attitude towards road safety as well as encourage learners to be aware of road safety challenges in their community.

Last, but not least, MEC Lehari in his many engagements met with the leadership of SANTACO were he pleaded with SANTACO to continue playing a critical part in ensuring that their members adhere to the law and operate legally. This, in a quest to maintain stability in the taxi industry within the North West Province in particular.

Meanwhile the 2022 October Transport Months is loading in earnest.

Onkabetse Thuto Technical, a rural based school in Setlagole village, has emerged as number one, following their eloquent debate skills beating three other schools at the recent Provincial Road Safety Debate Competition held in Rustenburg.

Presenting on whether digital innovation is the best approach to promote road safety, a well prepared team of three boys and one girl delivered well researched debate content.

In second position is Vryburg High, the

school that will represent the Province in the urban category at the National competition.

The Participatory Education Technique (PET) competition that was held simultaneously with the debate, also emerged with a rural St Pauls Secondary School from Taung. The school will represent the Province in the rural category after beating Realeka Secondary school from Ottosdal and B.A. Seobi Secondary from Potchefstroom. In his address, the Acting Head of Department of Community Safety and

Transport Management, Mr Mole fi Morule challenged both competitions to produce a team of future reservoirs who will lead and advocate for road safety.

"Amongst the learners participating here lays solutions to our problematic road canages and incidents which take the lives of our beloved ones. It is evident that their future is bright as they continue to advocate for road safety.

From here, we must have a provincial











blue print and come up with a team that will represent the Province meaningfully during the National competitions," said Morule.

The Acting HoD further appealed to the Department to keep the momentum and continue working with schools to ensure that road safety becomes a concern for everyone.

In 2014, Jevan Ferris from Vryburg applied for the Basic Traffic Diploma through a learnership programme with the Department of Community Safety and Transport Management. Due to the high demand for the learnership he was not accepted at that time. However, he was determined and kept applying with the hopes of one day becoming a traffic officer.

In 2021 he received a call of acceptance into the programme. There is no doubt that the young man has a bright future ahead of him.

"I have made so many sacrifices, the journey leading up to this point has not been easy. I have my wife to thank for always being my anchor and encouraging me to follow my dream. Giving up was the easiest choice but I decided to persevere because I believe this is truly my destiny.

"Saving people's lives is what I intend to do once I officially become a traffic officer because I am passionate about law enforcement and making a

positive contribution where I can," said the 27 year old who could not contain his excitement when thinking about life and future prospects.

Reoikantse Mooketsi, hails from Swartruggens and is determined to make the most of her time at the college as it has provided knowledge and insight that she never could imagine to obtain.

"This entire experience has reignited my passion for this career path. I knew it was going to be











different and intensive but my lived experience is way beyond what I had imagined.

"I don't think a lot of people get the opportunity to experience this kind of training and I am truly grateful. We miss our families back home but we need to focus on the bigger picture because when we leave here, all the tears and sacrifices would have been worth it," said the 22 year who shed a tear while thinking about making her family proud.

The two young people are part of the selected 51 learners who are currently undergoing training at the Mpumalanga Traffic College. The MEC for Community Safety and Transport Management Sello Lehari is pleased with the learners' progress saying that they will become a significant contribution to the law enforcement force of the North West Province.

"The learners have displayed a high level of discipline, I am impressed with the feedback on their training progress thus far. This is an indication that we have made a great selection to add to the law enforcement officials.

"Upon completing their training, the learners will be appointed officially by the department and this is how we are dealing with the high unemployment rate especially amongst deserving young people," said MEC Lehari who was accompanied by a delegation of senior management during the visit to the college.



















#### MEC Lehari lays wreaths for fallen police



In remembrance of police officers who died while in line of duty, the North West MEC for Department of Community Safety and Transport Management, Sello Lehari and the North West Provincial Police Commissioner, Lieutenant General Sello Kwena have laid wreaths on memorial wall at Police headquarters in Potchefstroom.

MEC and Commissioner were followed by family members of the fallen heroes and heroines, who also laid wreaths for their beloved ones.

This sombre ceremony is an annual commemoration of lives slained by random criminals.

In his address, MEC Lehari said paying tribute to anyone who has

passed on, even as a commemoration is not an easy task, more so in the manner they have died.

"Any killing of Police is a devious action which is an act of lawlessness. An attack on police is an attack on law and order which by reference is an assault to the Constitution of the Republic.

"These officers died in fighting crime, for the love of their country. We salute them for their selflessness and bravery they displayed in serving and protecting the people of the North West Province," said Lehari.

Provincial Commissioner Kwena expressed his heartfelt condolences to the bereaved families and

condemned the killing of police in strong possible terms.

The Province has lost seven hardworking and dedicated police officers who died in the line of duty during the reporting period of 2021 to 2022.

MEC Lehari was accompanied by Acting Head of Department Mr Mole fiMorule, Acting Chief Director of Civilian Secretariat for Police Ms Dikeledi Letsapa, Provincial Community Policing Forum Chairperson Mr Dixon Ngamla.

The event was also attended by the North West Head of Independent Electoral Commission Dr. Tumelontle Thiba and Director of Public Prosecution Dr. Makhari-Sekhaolelo.













## NW transport committees find linkage to improve public transport



NW transport committees find linkage to improve public transport

The continuous engagements between Provincial Regulatory Entity (PRE) and North West Public Transport Intervention Team (NWPTIT) to deal with the status quo on the public transport in the Province came out as one of the resolutions during the two-day working session for the two critical committees held in Rustenburg.

The working session was scheduled by the Department of Community Safety and Transport Management to interface and find ways to work together in improving the public transport industry.

These two critical committees are responsible for shaping the

public transport operations in the Province, with PRE being appointed for the adjudication and approval of taxi operational permits, while the NWPTIT was officially appointed in September 2021 to investigate the causes of conflicts, develop remedial actions and implementation in the province.

The intervention team has so far conducted a taxi audit, route verification and investigated more than 37 cases of conflicts.

In his presentation to the session, the NWPTITT chairperson Mr Phenye Vilakazi says the team has successfully managed to resolve 22 of the 37 cases after interacting with taxi associations.

Conflict and violence remain a challenge for the taxi industry in the country including the province,

with a new identified pattern of door-to-door operators who are paralyzing the industry.

During the deliberations, the two committees realized the shortfall, lack of close working relations or communication which led to a number of challenges that contributes to the cause on some of the route conflicts.

It is as a result of deliberations, the committees guided by the senior management of directorate working with the committees resolved for continuous meetings to strategise on how they will together stabilize the public transport sector.

In his closing remarks of the meeting, the Acting Chief Director for Transport Regulations, Mr Paul Stone called for information sharing and constant communication between the two committees and the Department to close the existing gaps that are causing the shortfalls.

"We are faced with these shortfalls as a result of lack of communication. The PRE must know what is happening at the NWPTIT and the same goes on the other side.

"We need to clean and organise ourselves and start working on reaching our goals which are clearly aligned with the vision and mission of the Department," said Mr Stone in his closing remarks.











## The roll out of GBVF campaigns amplified in districts



The Department of Community
Safety and Transport Management's
response to Gender Based Violence
and Femicide (GBVF) is essentially to
strengthen existing mechanisms
through a multi sectoral, cohesive
and intensive awareness campaign
implemented at a district level. This
includes victim empowerment
programmes, the establishment of
active Community Policing Forums
(CPFs) and the involvement of unified
community structures to name a few.

In the first quarter of the 2022/23

financial year the department has implemented GBVF campaigns in the province.

The Director for Crime Prevention
Partnerships, Ms Florence Nchoe says
the Groot Marico policing precinct in
Ngaka Modiri Molema has identified a
trend where cases of GBVF against
perpetrators are often discontinued
by victims. This remains a concern as
victims are potentially influenced to
do so against their will and the abuse
tends to continue.

"The fears of stigma, lack of

economic and financial
emancipation often lead women
and those who are most
vulnerable in our society to
become hesitant when reporting
cases of violence. Through the
department's awareness
campaigns we provide a safety
net to victims by bringing
together stakeholders under the
banner of crime prevention to
destigmatise asking for help.

"We organise ourselves as government departments and entities to take services directly











to our people through the District Development Model (DDM) approach. This integration allows us to maximise the impact in our ventures to restrict high levels of crime in all communities throughout the province," said Nchoe.

Crime in general requires active participation by all stakeholders. In Ganalaagte, the community welcomed the initiative and displayed a unified willingness to play their part in dealing with the scourge. The Tswaing Local Municipality Mayor, Cllr Norah Mahlangu described the campaign as a platform that creates sustainable solutions.

"The police cannot be expected to fight crime alone, as a community we are agree that crime can never thrive while we sit back. We live with criminals amongst us and we refuse to enable them by keeping quiet.

"We are ready to work together with the police, our traditional and religious leaders as well as the entire community at large to bring lasting solutions to fight crime through this platform," added Mahlangu.
